A DENMAN TRIUMPH: Broken Angel at the Community Hall

As Bill Engleson stated at the Opening of Broken Angel at the Community Hall, Feb 24/25th, "No two people here will have the same experience." As a radio play bought to the stage, the imagination of the audience must supply the visual context. Part of the buildup of curiosity about the production was just that: seeing how this adaptation of a radio play to the stage would work. But work it did: full houses of very attentive audiences for both performances, and standing ovations at the end. Broken Angel was a professional job: well-rehearsed, cleverly adapted, carefully staged, mood-lit by candles lined up along the stage front, and fully realized by fine music.

The story itself involves a homeless woman bought into Vancouver General in a coma. Nothing is known about her but a UBC medical researcher, Ann (played by Nancy Snyder), takes an interest as a focus of her research into Medical Intonation Therapy. This therapy is used to communicate through music with people trapped in a coma or disabled by dementia. The homeless woman is a good prospect because she has an enlarged part of her brain that is associated with musicians, and especially singers. Eventually it is discovered that the woman is, in fact, the researcher's mother.

Broken Angel is a feel-good story that hangs very much off the music that is the point of the whole thing. In particular, the performance relies heavily on the rich contralto of Deneen Baldwin who plays the comatose woman. Her wistful renderings

of well known songs such as Georgia on my Mind form a coded language through which she tries to communicate. With the aid of an erudite UBC musicologist, Charlie Swanton (played by Ian Lark), the meaning of these songs is gradually decoded, assisted by the timely emergence of people who are able to unravel the woman's past. In so doing, there is the promise that Ann can at last be comfortable with the love Charlie has long borne her.

Deneen's voice, and the guitar and saxophone of Ram Sudama fill the sails of the action, setting the stage, and keeping the play on course.

Why a festival celebrating herring?
Every year in late February and early March, the waters around Hornby Island turn into a marine food chain feeding frenzy - sea birds, killer whales, sea lions and eagles abound, and the water turns a milky blue-green. Pacific herring will spawn all around Hornby and Denman Islands.

According to Dr Doug Hay (Scientist Emeritus, DFO fisheries advisor) **“Lambert Channel [the body of water that separates Hornby and Denman Islands] is THE most important herring spawning area in British Columbia.”** (Fact Check: adimsblog.files.wordpress.com/2013/12/aquaculture-impacts-on-herring-in-lambert-channel-letter.pdf)

During the spawn, 20% of all the herring in our area and elsewhere in the Strait of Georgia will be caught, ostensibly to sell the roe to the Japanese, even though they aren't paying what they did in the late 1970s to the late 1990s – prices to fishermen have dropped from a high of \$5000 per tonne to several hundred dollars.

Why does the herring roe fishery continue then? It's not a herring “roe” fishery, it is a “reduction” fishery that is supposedly illegal. Here's why.

Only about 10% of the catch is used for human consumption. The rest is rendered mostly into feed pellets for the salmon farming industry - not a good use of a resource so crucial to the survival of many endangered species.

Reduction fisheries (fisheries that “reduce,” or turn their catch, into fishmeal and fish oil) in Canada are “banned without Ministerial permission”. The herring roe fishery is not viewed as a reduction fishery since the carcasses used for fishmeal are a ‘by-product’ of the roe fishery. This seems counter-intuitive, especially when the “by-product” accounts for 90% of the weight, and the roe has become economically almost worthless. Basically, this is a reduction fishery for the farm fish industry, with a by-product of roe for the Asian market.

Herring can spawn seven or eight times over their lifetime, so this kill-fishery not only removes huge biomass from the overall herring population, but also eliminates their opportunity to reproduce in future years. This makes no sense.

Overfishing of herring has led to a major reduction of the Pacific Herring stocks in the Central and North Coasts, Haida Gwaii and the West Coast of Vancouver Island. Area 15 around Powell River was just added to the herring roe fishery closures due to the actions of the community of Powell River and the Tla'Amin First Nation.

We believe that if DFO continues to

apply current management practises in the Strait of Georgia it may have a major impact on our coastal marine ecosystem and particularly around Hornby.

As BC Green Party leader Dr. Andrew Weaver states, "The historical and ongoing treatment of herring by DFO is a tragedy. The constant theme underlying years of collapses and management failures is a complete disregard for the essential role these forage fish play in B.C.'s ecosystem and First Nations culture. Whales, dolphins, seals, sea lions, cod, salmon and sea birds all feed heavily on herring,

making those small fish hugely important in the coastal ecosystem. This miraculous, mysterious species – which provides a foundation for so many – needs more support." (<http://www.andrewweavermla.ca/?s=herring>)

Hornby's HerringFest aims to educate Strait of Georgia communities as to the importance of herring and involve like-minded organizations in the protection of this valuable species.

What is Proposed Bylaw No.225 about?

Bylaw No. 225, if adopted, would amend the Denman Island Land Use Bylaw by adding a general prohibition against the use of vehicles and ground-based machinery in the W1, W3 and W4 zones.

Note: Aquaculture operations that are licensed under the Fisheries Act (Canada) may be entitled to operate vehicles or ground based machinery in accordance with the terms of the license.

Each song and musical utterance is a reminder that music is life itself and forms the subtext of the performance.

The play pits the preppy medical researcher, Ann, adopted as a child by upper middle class parents who are both physicians, against the reality of her birth mother, victim of a Sadean world of crime and injustice. It is not clear, at the very end, after the mother's true identity is revealed, if her daughter will be able to accept her mother's reality. Her horrified doubts are fought to a standstill by irrefutable evidence that she is connected by birth to the consequences of, to her, an otherwise unthinkable life. Like the professor who unwittingly becomes the subject of their own experiment, Ann finds herself in denial of what is happening. For the play, what matters is the restoration of her mother to emotional justice; for the daughter, there is the implication of a journey of acceptance that calls into question the reality that she once regarded as normal.

The actors read from podiums, interacting with each other without

any need for more than the most minimal dramatic gestures. Possibly the most compelling performance was turned in by Sister Elise

(Sheelah McGill), her mother's childhood companion in the brothel where they were raised. Her sorrow and painful admission of mistakes is essential in establishing the mother as a true object of compassion. But everyone was well cast.

Veronica Timmons conveyed a compassionate sense of reason as the psychiatrist Dr. Wilson who tries to deal with Ann's deep-set anxiety about love that ultimately arises from adoption. Bill Englesohn was an imposing and authoritative Dr. Alan Mackay. The nurse, Joan Fox was a watchful intermediary between experts. Alan Stoddart, as Detective David Miller, pieced the story together with the reassuring certitude of a sound Scottish accent. And Nancy Snyder managed a very effective transformation from intense professional to bedeviled victim of her mother's misfortunes.

Lee Andra Jacobs, as Marie Claude, the mother's prison companion, provided a much-needed touch of sardonic comic relief with her extravagant hat and cheerful black humour. The only reservation I have is Marie Claude's transformation into an all-seeing guru as a result of experiments with LSD conducted on female inmates at Kingston in the 1960s. Although the possibility of such a jest may be irresistible, it might be seen to make sport of what is recognized as a scandalous abuse of prisoner rights.

That Denman can mount such a high quality production of an original work is a tribute to Dante Ambriel and producer Tashi Draper. Broken Angel is something of which we can all be proud.

terms of engineering and bureaucracy. Also, Coop members were concerned that 15 additional households using groundwater could compromise the aquifer, so the Coop depends on rainwater catchment. Since flush toilets account for at least a third of family water usage, the recourse to sewage tanks is minimal with use of grey water systems and built in compost toilets. Laura and Tomas find the arrangements work perfectly well because no one takes water usage for granted.

When the Coop was finally approved, the seven-acre building site was simply a blank circle on the plan. Members could divide up the land as they saw fit, with a maxi-

mum house size of 1500 sq. ft. Some people camped out or built small sheds while they worked on their homes, but the first thing to go up was the common house because the Coop is a community, and the common house is its heart. That has very much been the benefit of the place. People keep an eye out for each other, help out, and get together in their homes and the common house. Time seems to settle out most disagreements and levels of commitment rise and fall with people's lives.

The Coop is an expression of deep-seated beliefs in community, environmental respect and sustainability. Ironically, as Laura points out, it is actually built on the much older concept of the village. Today the Coop is a world of its own

surrounded by plenty of forest and houses tucked away in various states of completion in off-road clearings. The question is how readily this achievement of deliberate community can be repeated.

Laura and Tomas are of the opinion that efforts to create a coop are still challenging, even with regulatory recognition. But they also believe that the Coho Landing project has made some parts of the process easier by paving the way and by showing people that yes, it is possible and it works. They point out that their particular solution is not the only model – the Coho Landing Coop is, to some extent, a unique product of its times. There are other variants, other models, and other times, but it can be done

Megan Rose and Henri Faberge will be hosting another comedy event, an improv showdown, on Denman on Saturday, March 31st. If Friday night was anything to go by, it should be even more fun.

MUSEUM NEWS 2018

Let there be light!

Well, it's February; the days are growing lighter (not to mention whiter).

And The lights are getting brighter-- in our Denman museum!

DSMS, with the expert assistance of electrician, Mike Lindsay have provided new lights to illuminate the museum's display cabinets. While showing off all the artefacts in the cabinets to better advantage, the new lighting also adds a warmer ambience to the entire space.

Although the museum doesn't reopen until July, work continues behind the scenes. The Museum and Archives Committee are currently busy planning and preparing new initiatives.

As well as literally shedding light on the past through the display of interesting old objects, the museum's role encompasses the preservation of our history in another way: through the living memories of people. To this end two of our volunteers have been engaged over the past year and a half in collecting and preserving some of the stories and reminiscences of those seniors who can remember Denman Island in a different era: from about the late 1920's to 1960. This is an oral history project and was enabled by a grant from Canada 150 and Comox Valley Community Foundation.

From the 12 people we interviewed we have selected the recollections of ten, and from those 10 hours of individual video interviews we have compiled a single video of about one hour in length, which aims to pro-

vide a glimpse into what life was like for ordinary people on Denman Island during that time. All of these individual interviews will be preserved in their entirety in the museum archives.

The debut of the completed video which we have simply called "Look-

ing Back" will be presented in the Denman Activity Centre on April 8th. We are hoping that everyone who is interested in Denman's history, will come and view this short film and help us celebrate the contribution that these remarkable seniors have made. Please mark the date on your calendars: April 8 at 2.30 p.m.

THE AFFORDABLE LIFE CoHo Landing Coop • Part 2

In setting up the Coho Landing Coop, Laura and Tomas Busheikin point out that angel benefactors are one thing, but the Coop would never have come together without the talents and persistence of the stakeholders. When they were first getting started, Denman's Official Community Plan (OCP) did not have any policies supporting affordable housing projects. Luckily, just at this time, the OCP was being opened up for major review. The members of the coop planning group joined the ensuing community discussions, focussing on the need for innovative approaches to housing. There was plenty of community support for the creation of new housing policies. In the end, the revised OCP had language promot-

ing rezoning for affordable, special needs and seniors' housing – a signal achievement that offers a chance to protect Denman's way of life.

Rezoning the land was a challenging process and a huge learning opportunity. It took tremendous patience to deal with public criticism, raise awareness, contend with complex regulations, work with planners, and convince local politicians, who were hearing widespread support but also some opposition, mostly due to concerns about increased density. Fortunately, the group had the grit and the skillsets to see the process through, and the property was successfully rezoned to permit 15 affordable housing units.

Getting the land and the rezoning was just the start. An essential element of affordability is keeping it affordable. The Coho Landing Coop is very much in the Islands tradition of DIY. Members have built their houses with their own hands and neighbours' help, and have taken charge by purchasing a Kubota backhoe to help them dig out driveways and clear land, find someone cheaper than Hydro to set the power poles, and even tender their own blasting contract.

The property has a well, but installation of a water system would be expensive and complex, both in

VICTORIA PIANO QUARTET

At the Community Hall

Concerts Denman continues to bring great classical music to the island. Set aside this coming Sunday afternoon, March 4th, for some of the most ravishing works for piano quartet from the Romantic and late Romantic eras. The Victoria Piano Quartet will play the Denman Community Hall at 2:00 PM March 4th. That should leave plenty of time for music-lovers from Hornby and Courtenay/Comox to enjoy an exceptional concert and get back home in good time.

The Victoria Piano Quartet consists of Lorraine Min (piano), Terrence Tan (violin), Pam Highbaugh (cello) and Yaniv Alani (viola). They will be performing three of the major works in the piano quartet repertoire.

Robert Schumann had written almost no chamber music at all before he produced five masterpieces in his "Chamber Music year" of 1842. *The Piano Quartet in E Flat Major* is one of the standard works in the chamber music repertoire and is justly famed for its beautiful 3rd movement, *Andante Cantabile*,



in the opinion of some, one of the most plangent heart-rending melodies ever written.

The powerful Brahms *Piano Quartet No. 3 in C Minor* is blockbuster stuff as string quartets go, exhibiting Brahms command of complex counterpoint with irregular rhythms underlain by deeply Romantic themes. Not for nothing was Brahms rated amongst the three B's – Beethoven, J. S. Bach and himself.

Gustav Mahler's *Piano Quartet in A Minor* is a short, precocious work written in 1876 at the Vienna Conservatoire at the age of fifteen or sixteen. It is Mahler's only surviving piece of chamber music without voice. The Quartet, in one movement, has intimations of the characteristic uneasy melancholy of late nineteenth century Vienna and has only one musical instruction: "Not too fast" (perfect for the Islands). There are notes for a 24-bar scherzo in G Major, but the piece was never published, with only one more performance in Mahler's lifetime. The Quartet was then lost until it was rediscovered by his widow, Alma Mahler in the 1960s. Since then the Quartet has joined the canon and even featured in Martin Scorsese's film, *Shutter Island* with Leonard di Caprio.

Astronomical Observations for March

February wasn't much for viewing in the Night's Skies . . . March is somewhat mediocre. The month starts with a Full Moon - known to some Indigenous Peoples as the Full Worm Moon because the ground because to thaw from Winter's chill.

If you arise from your slumber early enough during the first week or so of

March you will be greeted with the planetary alignment of Saturn, Mars and Jupiter - look to the southeastern horizon before dawn. The waning gibbous moon will slink by each planet starting on the 7th and between Mars and Jupiter on the 8th.

March 20th marks the day on which the Sun shines directly above the

equator. Giving the Earth a day that has equals amount of day and night - the March Equinox or Vernal (Spring) Equinox in the Northern Hemisphere.

Once again - we have a Blue Moon - a second Full Moon in on month - on March 31st.

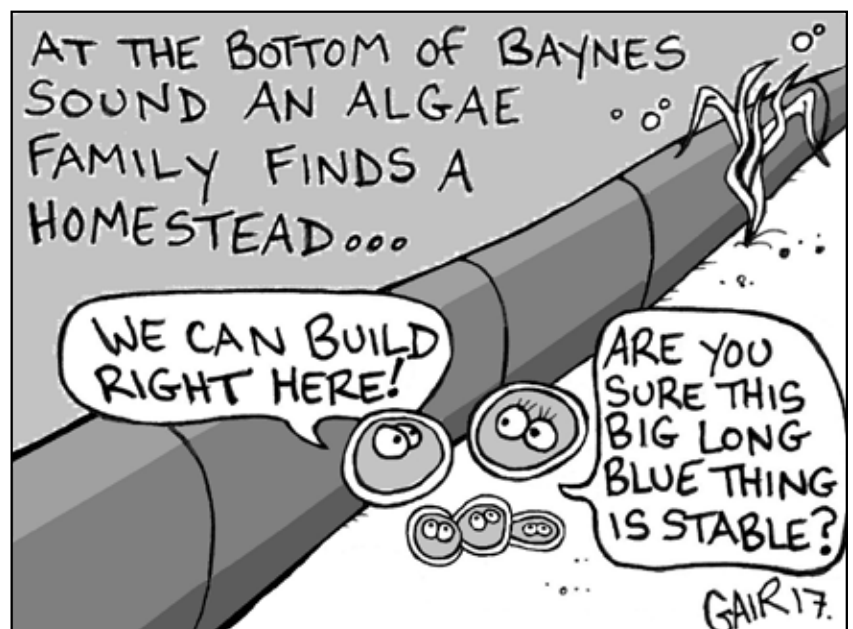

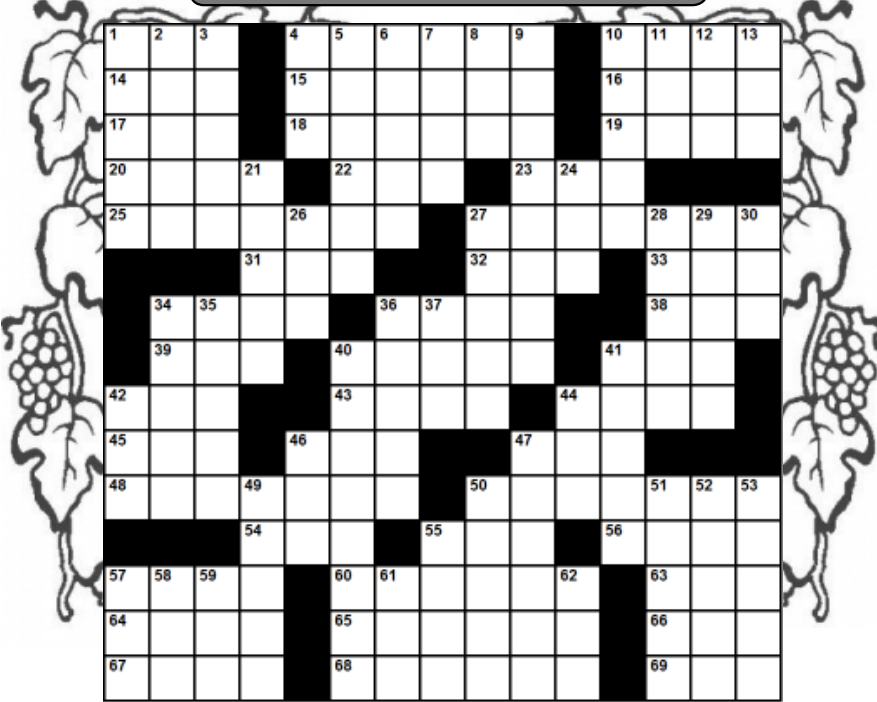
