*I think that most of us have determined that there's little in life that's free. You have your Grapevine of course, and Denman and Hornby each support thriving free-stores. Aside from that guy telling me I was free to go and *%\$# myself in town the other week, I'm drawing blanks as to what else. The minute you land in Buckley Bay, the spending begins and the cost of life is constantly thrust in your face. If not in dollars, then certainly in one's time as you stand about in line-ups most everywhere.*

As such, it's no surprise that Hornby would be the setting for a free Bus Service. A pilot project six years in the making, this past Tuesday saw the launch of its second year. Year one (August 2017) was deemed successful enough to run the project for two months this time around. The Grapevine was on hand to bear witness to this free-ness. Something so elusive as this would surely be worth a story.

Funded in large part by local businesses with some help from the CVRD, the blue bus is looking to build on the 2000 riders it had from last year. If the pilot continues to prove successful the goal would be

to see the initiative through to public/private partnership. At that point "the bus would become a white bus,"

said Gord Campbell, Executive Director of Tribune Bay Outdoor Education Centre and the one overseeing the pilot. As I was there to 'get the story,' I felt it important to ask the hard hitting questions. "What's the significance of the bus being blue then?" I queried. "Oh, nothing

AN EXCITING NEW (OLD) FUNDRAISING IDEA: The Hornby Island Trade Token

My name is Jim Bulmer and I have been a coin collector for over 50 years. Last year my wife, Dr Barbara Froehner, and I moved back to Hornby Island, B.C. from Germany. After being away for some time, we came back with fresh eyes.

Familiarizing ourselves with the Island by reading old newspapers, it seemed as, with everywhere else, one of the main activities was fundraising. Everyone needs money, and there just isn't enough for everyone.

About 15 years ago, in Lincoln, Nebraska (of all places), I stumbled across a large and comprehensive collection of Canadian Municipal Trade Tokens (MTT's), which had examples from across Canada, from Tofino, B.C. to Gander, Newfoundland and Inuvik, NWT to Manitoulin Island, Ontario. I learned how MTT's work and their history and thought this fundraising idea might

work on Hornby.

INFORMATION:

My collection dates from 1958 to 1990, and most of these older MTT's are single-metal, coin-like pieces of \$1.00 or \$2.00 value. Most were minted in fairly large quantities and sold as change from participating businesses.

On the first of six scheduled circuits of the island, I could see that Hornby was a little later to rise than we as we found each stop had no one waiting. Good thing we happened upon James, hitchhiking as he does. First words out of his mouth as he hopped aboard; "nice to see you're back!" Yeah Baby! **FREE!!**

In returning to the Ringside, I could see that the island was coming alive. This service, repeatedly passing through the main centre

These new ones are different: With a value of \$20.00; it is large, has multicolored enamels filling the designs, and it is sold by customer request.

They are very much a "Souvenir Dollar", with Beautiful Motifs and a Timely Message which reflects Hornby Island.

They are not cheap...but your \$20 gets you value for money: A large 2" solid Brass and Enamel Token, Low mintage of 1,000 pieces, and (possibly) first in a series. The Pins are 1" Brass and Enamel and cost \$3. (Makes a great Gift!)

MTT's work best when they are the product of Fundraising for a Charitable Organization. So it would be best for this Project to be sponsored by one of the Island's Charitable Organizations, but however good an idea might be, it takes money and time, and Boards of Directors always need "numbers".

So, we decided to do it ourselves.

The designs are my own, and Awards Canada of Winnipeg tiddly'd them up for production:

Obverse: Hornby Island superimposed on a Canadian Maple Leaf resting atop Blue Waves from the B.C. Flag, "HORNBY ISLAND BRITISH COLUMBIA" around, Serial Number. (Sets out the specific area of use.)

Reverse: A Forrester planting a tree and an Orca breaching, "GOOD FOR \$20 MAY 1 - OCTOBER 31 2018", and this year's theme: "CON-

SERVATION". (Sets out the Value, Period of Validity, and Island Message.)

Barbara and I are completely financing this project....WHY? What's in it for you? Who are you?

Why: Because I think it will work: It is a proven concept in an untried market with good tourist turn-around. "Fortune favors the bold" (Yikes)

What's in it for me? : First, the ability to do something useful in a capacity where I have the expertise to do it.

Second, this could potentially bring in a lot of money to the Island over several years.

What greater thrill for a coin collector than to Design, Produce and Issue a successful series of coins.

Who are we? : Barbara is the new Physician on Hornby and since leaving the Canadian Military, I have been house-husband and part-time coin dealer. We met and married in Lahr, Germany, spent 20 years in the U.S. and several in Germany, and came home to B.C. last year.

INFRASTRUCTURE:

It started with an informative article in the local monthly paper about MTT's, their use and history.

I then talked to the Economic Council people and the Community Fund people on Hornby, to decide where profits would go and how to market that information.

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I created a design and sent it to Awards Canada in Winnipeg for preparation and started advertising the Pilot Project.

After a couple more newspaper articles, the MTT's arrived and I started introducing them in earnest, going to public meetings and local businesses. Most had an inkling of what I was talking about from the newspaper articles, but seeing them, holding them and the small pins that are with them, the interest and energy began to grow.

Hornby is a very accepting place and doing your own thing is good. I kind of barged in with this, all new ideas and stuff, but the Island has been very positive about it, if not a wee bit perplexed...How does it work and how are we involved ?

More than anything, it is a Souvenir to take home, your \$20 has gone to support a worthy cause and all money stays on the Island. It is worth \$20 on Hornby Island from May 1 to October 31, 2018. (And this is where the barging-in happens) The Token is for and about the entire Island, and so anticipates co-operation and acceptance by the whole Island, but there are some, who for many reasons, are uncomfortable with strange money-ideas, and I am thrusting it upon them.

The first mission of the Project is to cause no-one harm. This has to be cost and hassle-free for all involved, so if a customer decides to spend a Token at a local vendor, that vendor will be reimbursed immediately (then the Token goes for resale). For those who live here, the tokens are always redeemable and no-one will

lose money (except me if it doesn't work).

I had the infrastructure work pretty much done by the July 1 weekend, and quite a few local businesses have offered to sell and accept them. Local advertising was in place and signs were posted around the Island. The Village Market (Ringside) was good with them and we now have a Farmer's Market booth for the summer (There's Me and Barbara on Canada Day weekend).

CONCLUSION:

We have 1,000 Tokens to sell. As well as 2,000 matching Pins. If all goes well, there will be enough money to donate a healthy chunk to the Community Fund and to fund this project for another year.

Island businesses have been very positive about this Project and are coming up with their own ideas such as inter-business games with serial numbers, who sells the most, and a Design competition.....So Cool !

I saw the work of Charles Lewton-Brain, the Canadian master form folder working in metal and was determined to form fold in silver.

I began researching forging tools, silver materials and torches. I contacted Bill Fretz, the best jewelry hammer maker in North America and purchased a set of very specialized hammers. Soon I had a full jeweller's set up and began. I equipped myself with videos and how to books.

I discovered Argentium Silver - a

special patented blend that has a higher silver content than sterling and is tarnish resistant for people who's skin reacts to silver in an unpleasant way. I never looked back on sterling silver again. Everyone loved



the brightness and tarnish resistant qualities.

I wanted to create beautiful forged silver bracelets, with the right proportions, balance and symmetry to be comfortable, striking and long lasting. I wanted designs that would look great in a casual setting or with

LOCAL MEAT AT THE FARMERS MARKET

“Buy your meat from someone you know and trust.” That’s what Sam Croome said when I asked him a few questions about the pork he and Emily of Two Roads Farm raise and sell – and I think many of us on Denman agree. If you’re going to eat meat, it’s important to know how the animals are treated and to make decisions based on all the information available.

Sam and Emily’s pigs are purebred large blacks, which they’ve chosen because the fat hasn’t been bred out of them, resulting in a delicious marbled product, amongst other reasons. Pork is available by the piece, side or you can get a sample



pack with a variety of cuts.

Tracy Horovatin of Ruby Slipper Ranch pasture-raises pigs and cows born on Denman Island. She’s making several types of pepperoni now and sells cuts at the market, or you can talk to her about ordering a side

or pork or beef. Naomi Elliot of Orkney Farm also brings pork cuts to the market and has beef available by the side.

Ask your farmers about the animals they raise – they’ve chosen breeds and methods for many reasons, and as long as they’re not busy, would probably love to share their ethics with you.

In other notes, next weekend a film crew from the series “Moose-

meat and Marmalade” will be filming at the market. If you don’t want to be on camera please stay out of the way of the camera crew. They will be focusing on Two Roads Farm but may then walk around filming other vendors. Thank you for your cooperation.



HOUSING NEEDS ASSESSMENT COMPLETED

VICTORIA – The Islands Trust Council has announced that housing needs assessments are now complete for the entire Islands Trust Area.

The Islands Trust has completed housing needs assessments for the northern islands including Denman, Gabriola, Gambier, Hornby, Lasqueti, and Thetis islands while the Capital Regional District has supported the completion of a similar assessment for the southern Islands including Galiano, Mayne, North Pender, South Pender, and Saturna Islands. Salt Spring Island has a housing needs assessment from 2015 and Bowen Island has a housing needs assessment that was updated in 2009.

The assessments evaluate the demographics, incomes, and housing stock in a community, allowing agencies with an interest in housing to quantify both housing need and the amount of housing stock available. The provincial government has recently recognized the importance of this form of data collection and now requires local governments to

conduct housing needs assessments every five years. With many communities in the Islands Trust Area experiencing a critical shortage in affordable accommodation, they come at a crucial time.

“The new housing needs assessments starkly illustrate the difficult housing situations that many people living in the Trust Area are currently experiencing,” said Peter Luckham, Islands Trust Council Chair. “Far too many of our island neighbours have a lack of housing security, with many forced to vacate during the summer season. Others live in substandard housing with serious potential health and safety risks. Others pay unsustainable amounts – beyond the recommended maximum of 30% of their income – to have a roof over their head.”

By quantifying housing need, housing needs assessments help governments plan and develop appropriately-scaled housing strategies. The assessments also offer the baseline evidence that affordable housing providers require when making their case for support to funders.

As land use authorities, local trust committees and Bowen Island Municipality control the rate and scale of development in the Trust Area. They do this through density and zoning decisions that balance the

need for housing while respecting the limits of the natural environment. Housing needs assessments allow local trust committees and Bowen Island Municipality to make informed decisions on the amount and nature of affordable housing their community requires.

The Islands Trust is a federation of special-purpose local government bodies representing 26,000 people living within the Islands Trust Area and another 10,000 non-resident property-owners. The Islands Trust is responsible for preserving and protecting the unique environment and amenities of the Islands Trust Area through planning and regulating land use, development management, education, co-operation with other agencies, and land conservation. The area covers the islands and waters between the British Columbia mainland and southern Vancouver Island. It includes 13 major islands and more than 450 smaller islands covering 5200 square kilometres.

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LAST DITCH EFFORT TO SHOOT FOR THE MOON

I am writing to two groups of people now. One are those who are faithful contributors to our walking efforts on Denman. For newcomers, we have been setting goals of accumulating distances over the last few years as a fun way to motivate people to be more active. Have we succeeded? I'm not sure, but I do know that we have gradually been going further each year. First we walked around BC (5,500 kms), then we walked across Canada on the Trans Canada Trail (17,000 kms), then we got a little competition going between walkers and cyclists to work our way around the world following Rick Hansen's Man in Motion Tour (40,000 kms). Having done all that we had nowhere to go but up, thus it is now Shoot For The Moon. (384,000 kms). So our current goal is really a quantum leap but one that in my mind is doable. I have said before that if everyone on Denman walks a km/day we would get to the moon in just one year. The real trick is to get as many of you as possible contributing to our goal.

So you may ask, how do I contribute. Well, in this issue of The Grapevine I have included a Personal Tracking Sheet for people to put up on their fridge (or in a drawer if you don't want it on the fridge) as an easy way



to track distances on a daily basis. Then all you need to do is add them up at the end of the month and enter them on the Activity Challenge 2018 tracking sheet found on the home page of the Activity Centre. This is found at denmanactivitycentre.com.

(The personal tracking sheet also has the website address on it.) On the actual tracking sheet, simply add your name on the next open space and then record your distance for the month on the appropriate column. Hopefully by participating you will be motivated to be active on a regular basis because being active is good for you.

A common question is how do I track my distance. The easiest way is if you have a smart phone it most likely comes with a Health app that automatically counts steps and Kms. Many people have tracking devices like Fitbits or Garmin. These will track your distances and usually your device will send the info to your phone or computer. We also have pedometers at the clinic you can have for free while they last to wear and keep track. Finally you can just estimate how far you walk and record that. You can also count cycling or any other activity. We are tracking activity at the gym at the Activity centre and adding those up as well. Finally you can send them to me by email (rawilson33@gmail.com) or drop them off at the clinic and I will record them for you.

This is my last ditch effort to get as many of you involved as possible because if we all work together I know we can make it to the moon.

We covered a good distance last year, about 125,000 kms but we are moving at a much slower pace this year. So please join in and help us out.

TALKING ABOUT DEATH WILL NOT KILL YOU

I have two reactions to this statement. One is very old and spends most of the time locked in a creaky cupboard somewhere in the back of what passes for my mind. Upon reading these words, it kicks open the cupboard door and bursts into my awareness with a rather startling “THAT’S TRUE!!!”, complete with bulging eyes and wild hair (think of ‘Animal’, the Muppets’ drummer).

I used to think this way. For much of my life, I was frightened of talking about death. This was, I have to admit, sometimes rather awkward since part of my professional life as a first responder was to deal with death in many different circumstances. It was also sometimes my job to break such sad news to people who did not yet know that they had become a widow or widower, or orphans, or no longer a brother or sister. Talking about death, however

– while never exactly comfortable – was something that I was required to do. So, I did it; as respectfully, as completely and as compassionately as I could.

My own death, however – that was out of bounds. Taboo. Not going there. I had been convinced from a very early age that death was a whim of God; something that might overtake us any day. So it might, but I thought that I would be tempting fate to discuss it or – good grief, actually *face* the inevitable.

It took me a long time to think about this properly. And when I did so, I *didn’t* die. I wasn’t struck down by a malevolent deity throwing lightning bolts, buses did not suddenly begin trying to run me over, aeroplanes did not drop out of the sky. In fact, nothing unpleasant happened.

This may have something to do with my thoughts on this subject taking place at around the time when I left religion behind. Then, I left a great many untruths behind along with my fear of death. I left behind all the things that I had been told by people who had no way of knowing if they were telling me the truth.

Which brings me to my up-to-date thought about talking about death: of *course* it won’t kill you. Talking honestly and rationally about death can only be positive. Is it a happy subject? Not to me, but death is not something that I face with the terror of hell, for example. Talking about it enables me to plan for the times leading up to it. It prevents me from ignoring the inevitability of it – which, let’s face it (pardon that pun) isn’t rational. It allows me to think about the time after I have gone; what it might mean for my children and friends. It allows me to plan my legacy.

I remind myself sometimes; talking about death fearlessly enables me and allows me to do things which need to be done while I am still alive. I call that a positive effect...

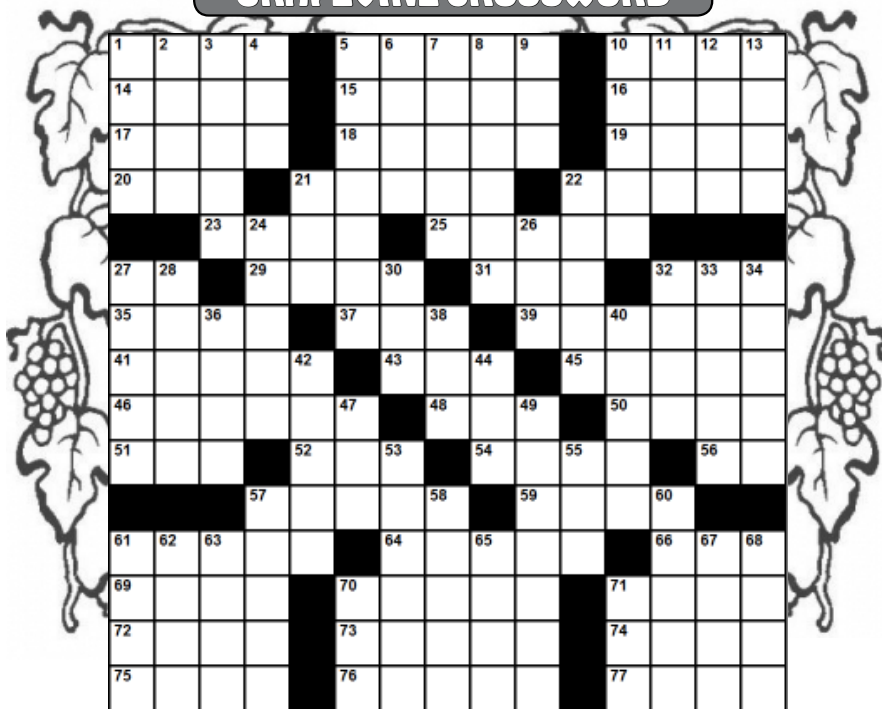

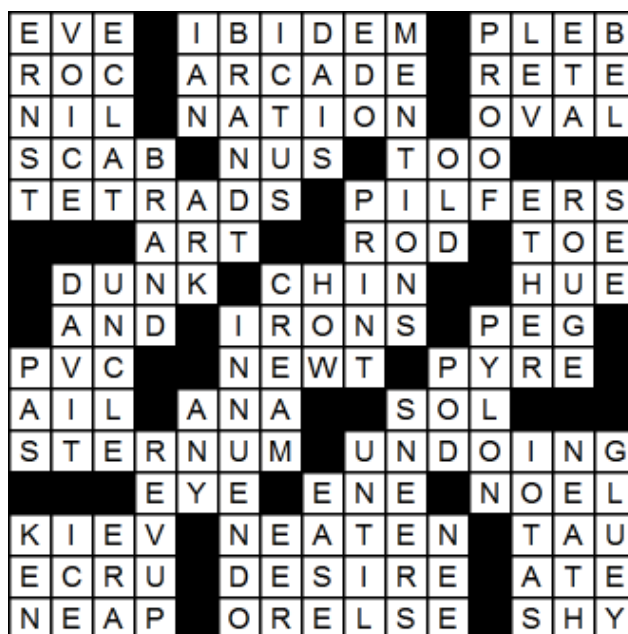
