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A SECOND GREAT RECESSION

*T*en years ago this month the financial services firm Lehman Brothers filed for bankruptcy protection, triggering the 2008 Crash and the subsequent Great Recession from which the world's economies have still not fully recovered. Will we look back on this month as the turning point when Donald Trump's trade war with China unleashed the Second Great Recession?



In the past week the slow dribble of tariffs and counter-tariffs has rapidly grown into a full-fledged confrontation between the world's two greatest economic powers.

In July the US imposed tariffs on \$34 billion worth of Chinese exports to the United States, extending them to another \$16 billion of Chinese goods in August. China responded cautiously, announcing roughly comparable tariffs on \$50 billion of US exports to China in August.

Trump deemed that unfair, and on Monday he slapped a 10 percent tariff on another \$200 billion of Chinese exports to the US, due to go

into effect at the end of this week. He warned that if China retaliated again, he would impose a similar tariff on all the rest of China's exports, another \$267 billion.

Trump also threatened to raise the rate of the tariff to 25 percent if there is no US-Chinese deal that meets US requirements by the end of the year. Did he imagine that this threat would force an autocratic regime like China's to back down and lose face? Who knows?

The Chinese replied hard and fast, announcing on Tuesday a new tariff

GETTING TO GO

Denman Green – the proposed 20-unit affordable housing project next to the Coho Landing cooperative on Denman Road – goes to public meeting on Saturday. The public meeting is a requirement under the Island Trust development application, and a record of the response is a necessary part of document. It's important to be there if you have something to say or want to learn more.

It's been a long road to get to even this point. According to project manager Simon Palmer, chair of the Denman Housing Association, the project is still early stages. So far, an agreement of intent to purchase has been signed for land, and BC housing has provided a forgivable loan for project development. Housing design is in the works, and site verification is in process to meet regulatory requirements for sewage, water and energy efficiency, amongst others, all of which are necessary to make application. Next Spring, Denman Housing will be applying to BC Housing for capital funding totalling approximately \$6.7 million which will include a \$1.5 million mortgage to be met from rents.

This is by far the largest housing project on Denman and the first public housing project to get to this point. The Hornby Island Beulah Creek project is going through a very similar process. The process is laborious and bureaucratically onerous, especially for a volunteer board. This week alone Simon will be deal-

ing with the water drilling company, Island Trust planners and development consultants, waste water consultants, and Ministry of Transport, on top of writing applications and keeping on top of the housing design. Yet, as public housing projects go, this is not, as Simon points out, unusual. The process is well understood. BC Housing has financed 60,000 affordable housing units throughout BC on this model. The involvement of public money is what makes it so complex. The difference is that on Denman and Hornby, the process is so much more personal. In larger centres, the application development process would be carried out by consultants and civic officials with hardly anybody knowing.

To some extent, the project has benefited from the talent right here, on Denman and Hornby. On the sustainability level, the board has professionals in the business such as Paul Marmion who is qualified in the certification given to advanced environmental buildings; Roger Chayer, a volunteer, is a professional energy adviser to BC Housing. Another board member, Shawn White, is expert on alternate energy on the Denman. The housing design is coming from the Hornby Island Beulah Creek project.

Denman Green responds to a known housing affordability problem on Denman. The Denman Housing Association carried out its own hous-

on all the rest of America's exports to China, worth some \$60 billion. So if Trump fulfills his threat and hits the remaining \$267 billion of Chinese exports as well, by next Sunday ALL America's imports from China and ALL China's imports from the United States will be paying tariffs.

China, trying to lower the temperature, is keeping its tariffs on US goods down to 5 percent for the moment, but it can't hold that line forever if the US goes on ratcheting up the ones it has imposed on China. Trump has got the trade war he was clearly itching for, and it's a much bigger deal than his spat with the European Union or his bullying of Canada.

We're still not talking about cataclysms here: China's trade to the US accounts for less than a quarter of its total exports, and its exporters will still get paid for what they sell. (It's the importer who pays the tariffs.)

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The same goes for US exports to China, which are only one-sixth of total American exports.

In the long run higher prices for Chinese goods in the US might damage its market share there, with negative effects on employment in China, but that's a slow process. The same applies to potential US job losses due to declining exports to China: they won't happen fast enough to have any impact on November's mid-term elections in the United States.

It's the long term that counts, and this trade war will probably not be settled for a long time. Multi-billionaire Chinese businessman Jack Ma predicts that it could last 20 years, which sounds a bit pessimistic, but as long as it lasts, it will poison relations between the world's two greatest powers.

Trump seems to think that China's economy is now so wobbly that the tariffs will push it over the edge, forcing it to come to the US begging for mercy. It's true that the Chinese economy is growing very slowly, if at all: nobody believes the official figure of six or seven percent annual growth. It's also true that the Chinese financial system is as overloaded with bad debts as American banks were in 2008.

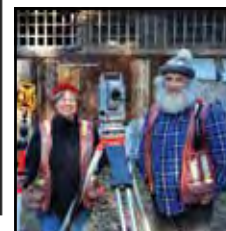
But China is only a sham capitalist economy. If lost exports to the US trigger a financial collapse in China – an unlikely but imaginable outcome – Beijing would slam the doors closed on international capital flows, bail out the Chinese banks,

and flood the domestic economy with cheap credit. In this scenario, it's international trade that would collapse, which wouldn't be in anybody's interest.

Meanwhile, Xi's regime would be stoking Chinese nationalism and blaming the United States for all the domestic misery. Indeed, Xi and the Communist Party hierarchy are coming to the conclusion that Trump's trade war is designed to "thwart China's rise." There can be no compromise with the United States if that is the case.

That's not just Chinese paranoia. There really are those around Trump (and elsewhere in Washington) who are encouraging his obsession with the American trade deficit with China for exactly that reason. Yet his obsession is completely misplaced: 85 percent of the seven million American manufacturing jobs lost since 2000 were eliminated by automation, not by trade.

This nonsense is going to go on for a long time, and everybody will end up at least slightly poorer, but it probably won't bring on the Second Great Recession. It may, however, start the Second Cold War.

ing needs study in 2013. The study showed that 90% of rental units were inadequate or did not have normal facilities. There were 120 people living in substandard rental housing, 20 of them children. To Simon, this is unacceptable. It has been shown, he says, that child development is impacted by poor housing with the accompanying financial insecurity. The Islands Trust followed with its own study published this year. Their conclusion was that 80 affordable housing units were needed immediately.

Denman Green will be meeting only 20% of the need.

The problem, Simon points out, is that Denman has very little public land. Cities and town usually have some parcels that they can deed, but Denman has very little. The Islands Trust is not a landowner, and there are only tiny parcels of available Crown land. The Agricultural Land Reserve, which takes up almost

half the island, is resolutely closed by the Agricultural Land Commission to housing development. That leaves private donors. Daniel Terry (of Denman Island Chocolate), has been a benefactor for both the Coho Landing cooperative, and Denman Green. Hornby also relied on a private donor for the Beulah Creek project. In both cases, there is a quid pro quo: a donation of land in exchange for a change to zoning on another parcel that will leverage economic development values. It's not straightforward. These deals must go through for the land to change hands. Even if the rezoning is approved, substantial landowners like Daniel Terry with the goodwill and sensitivity to island issues are no doubt rare.

The development of Denman Green relies on the contribution of BC Housing, which takes care of most of the capital development costs, reducing the financial burden to meeting mortgage, taxes, and running costs. But since Denman Green

is a non-profit and the housing must be affordable, the rents will be below market. Rents will be pitched according to ability to pay. Who might that include?

Like all privately run rental accommodations, Denman Green is entitled to its own tenant selection criteria. The primary intent is to help those working couples who could use decent accommodation. How might that play out in practise? Suffice it is to say that Denman Green is responding to a need that is urgent, even as defined.

"The measure of a good community," Simon believes, "is how well it responds to the needs of its least fortunate members" He feels that a successful implementation and track record can only build faith in the solution, but that Denman must start somewhere, now, at Denman Green.

Beginning on Saturday, September 22, the Recycling Depot will be accepting a new category of plastic called "Flexible Plastic Packaging." Examples include stand-up plastic pouches, chip bags, pasta bags, cereal box liners, net bags for produce, bubble wrap and frozen food zipper-lock bags. There will be a small display out front of the depot with more information including a brochure outlining the program.

This category of plastic is being used

for a development project in partnership with Merlin Plastics in the lower mainland. The stated aim of the pilot project is to recover and recycle as much plastic resin as possible. More information on this program can be found at www.RecycleBC.ca/FlexiblePackaging or come and see us during Recycling Depot hours.

The same rules apply to the recycling of these materials as all recyclables that come through the de-

pot. Please take a few moments to completely empty and rinse before bringing materials in for recycling. If there is any food or soil remaining on the packaging, it contaminates the surrounding material and will be put into land-fill. Over the summer we have had an increase in contaminated materials being brought to the depot, and as a result, we have had to put more recyclables into the garbage. Happy recycling!

Dylan McRae (who has come to Denman every summer of his life) works in many mediums. His powerful voice and incredible song writing ability has found a home with four other musicians that call themselves Still Fools.

Dylan McRae: Vocals, harmonica, keys

Geordie Wilson: Guitar, backing vocals

Mike Webster: Guitar

Mitsu Okamoto: Bass
Mark Taggesell: Drums

Their second album "Lightbringer" will be released this fall. I spoke at length with Dylan about Dreamstreaming and his creative process. Here are some excerpts from part 1 of our 4 part interview.

Dylan - "I've woken up and had a song in my head... a dreamsong I call it... when your unconscious-

ness gives you what you want to hear, note after note... When you find that state, as a creator, you're not forcing anything but just letting

it be. If you're thinking too much, thought can be dishonest.

With music, when it's just jamming, stream of consciousness flowing- as opposed to starting with structure- we'll jam and record it then we'll listen back to it to find the best part and play it over and over again... sometimes the words and the mu-

sic just come out together. Most of my music comes from just playing around - finding an atmosphere for the words.

I'm very inspired by Mythology; music can breathe a new life into old tales that have been around for thousands of years. A lot of the songs on "Lightbringer" have a Promethean vibe combined with the themes of Milton's Paradise Lost. "Lightbring-

er" is about dreams and searching for something that you lost - a lost soul looking for redemption - looking to be in the light of love."

COIN DESIGN: IF HORNBY WERE A GREEK ISLAND . . . *By Jim Bulmer*

. . . of the 5th century BC, what would her coins look like?

Coin design in the Western World has not changed much since the 7th century BC when coinage was first conceived; it was about Sending a Message. In the days when there were no newspapers, few roads and little travel, early trade coinage became the issuer's best means of advertising, whether the message was power, trade, tourism, art, resources or something else.

Fun Fact: Coin engraving is closely related to Gem and Seal engraving.

The Canadian 5 Cent piece is an excellent example of coin design: The Obverse (front) features the symbol of the authority that guarantees this money, and her title: Elizabeth the Second, Dei Gratia (By the Grace of God), Regina (Queen). (Traditionally, that is the highest of authorities, and Money is a very conservative concept.)

The reverse (back) tells us where the money is valid, for what amount, its date of issue (since value is no longer

calculated by weight, these must be spelled out), and a symbol important to Canadians, the Beaver.

Fun Fact: Since 1937, 2/3 of Canada's circulating coinage has been wildlife-themed.

Compare Canada's coinage to that of the U.S. where the principal themes are icons of Government and Power.

The themes of classical Greek coinage were the same: Athens, for example, sent a message of Power and Wisdom: Obverse: a portrait of Athena wearing a Victory Helmet; Reverse: her familiar, an Owl, with an Olive Branch above, and the word ATHE. (Rely on Athens for Wisdom and Peace, it warns!)

So... I.H.I.W.A.G.I.O.T.5.C.B.C.W.W .H.C.L.L. ?

Hornby is a Trading Island, who exports wine/spirits, pottery and art, creates music, and invites people to visit.

Two (of many) places in the Greek world with similar messages would

be the island of Thasos in the northern Aegean, and Naxos, a city in Sicily.

Thasos was home to the Cult of Bacchus, whose main export was wine, and the Bacchic Festival every 3 years was a popular tourist destination. Coinage was issued on the occasion of the festival and circulated widely, being taken as souvenirs and large quantities used in overseas trade. Most trade coins in the Greek world were silver and Thasos' coin was about 8 grams, with an image on only one side. The obverse image was of a Satyr (forest spirit) and a nymph (water spirit) engaged in a Bacchic Folk-Dance (very sexy). The reverse bore only the mark of the anvil on which the coin was struck.

The city of Naxos in Sicily grew immensely wealthy from its wine trade and could afford the finest artists to design its coins. The largest (about 17 grams and 1 1/8" diameter), featured a magnificent bust of Dionysos

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(also known as Bacchus), and on the reverse, Selinos (Local River God, follower of Dionysos) sits drunken and cross-legged drinking wine, and the word NAXI around the edge.

Fun Fact: Coin Reverse and Obverse changed sides in the 3rd century BC.

Things to consider:

1: What is Hornby known for? The Festival, Art, Music, Wine and Spir-its, Nature

2: Who are the patron Deities (being 5th century Greece)? Apollo (Art, Music, Healing), Dionysos/Bacchus (Wine, Merry-Making), Gaia (Earth Goddess), and our local protector gods, Queneesh (who saved the people), and the Orca who lives with us.

3: What is the message? Music, Art, Nature, please Visit.

My own design would be:

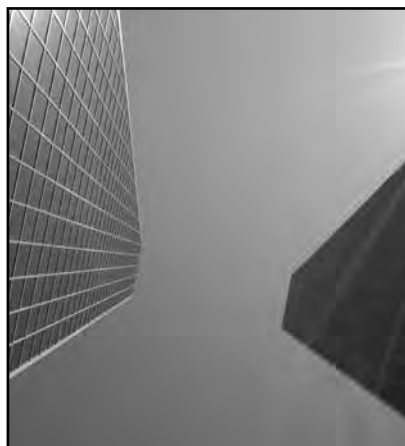
Obverse: Apollo (in who-ever form he takes) Sacrificing/Presenting the gift of Music (a Lyre, Guitar, Sax, Didgerido) to the Temple of Gaia, in which is a Cornucopia of Fruit (Farmer's Market is a good example of an Apollo/Gaia Temple).

Reverse: An Orca in Local style, and the letters H I

When few could read, write or travel, messages had to be simple and direct. The later Romans used coins as newspapers of a sort, with reverses that heralded news of victories, building projects, security, benevolence and other important political matters, on a coinage that circulated widely.

Look at the coins in your own pocket, what do they say?

Fun Fact: Coins carry such important information about the entity that issued them that they used to be held in the Documents Section of the British Museum 🍷

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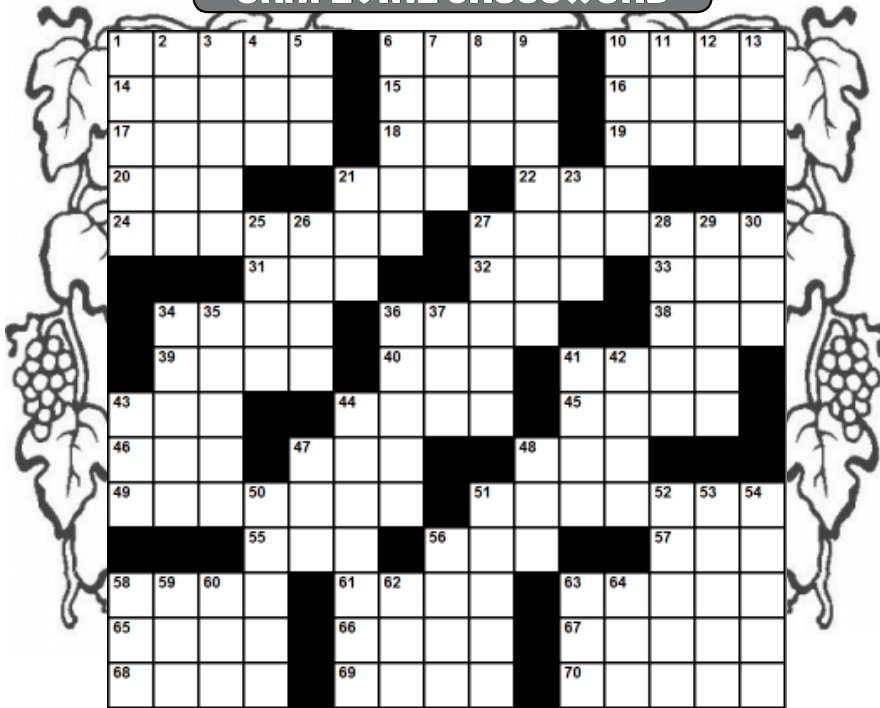
